


1.2.2 Current Native American Tribe Demographics

Of the 2,040 Native Americans currently incarcerated at ADCRR, the majority of those incarcerated are from the Navajo (40.5%) and the Pima (13.2%) tribes. About 23% of individuals who identified as Native American either did not specify their tribal affiliation or are affiliated with tribes outside of Arizona.

1.3 Current Custody Ratings

<u>Minimum Custody</u>: Inmates who represent a low risk to the public and staff. These inmates may work outside the secure perimeter of an institution, to include community work crews, and do not require controlled movement within the institution.

<u>Medium Custody</u>: Inmates who represent a moderate risk to the public and staff. These inmates shall not work outside the secure perimeter of an institution and may, at times, require limited controlled movement within the institution.

<u>Close Custody</u>: Inmates who represent a high risk to the public and staff. These inmates shall not be assigned to work outside the secure perimeter of an institution. These inmates require controlled movement within the institution.

<u>Maximum Custody</u>: Inmates who represent the highest risk to the public and staff and require housing in a single cell or double cell environment. These inmates have limited work opportunities within the secure perimeter and require frequent monitoring. These inmates require controlled movement within the institution. This custody level does not apply to inmates designated as a Serious Mental Illness (SMI) by the mental health, female inmates or juveniles adjudicated as adults.

2.0 Operating Capacity

Rated Beds are beds permanently part of a unit either by physical design, as defined by law or court order, or as determined in relation to staffing level, food service, and water and sewage capabilities. Temporary Beds are beds added to a unit in addition to permanent beds assigned to that unit. Operating Capacity is the sum of the rated beds and the temporary beds.

3.2 Admissions by Commitment Offense

Below is a table of the committed offenses for those admitted to ADCRR in January 2024 compared to January 2025. Consistent with January 2024, "Drug Possession" remains as the most frequent commitment offense in January 2025. However, there was over a 80% increase in January 2025 admissions for "Child/Adult abuse" (80.4%), "Manslaughter/Negligent homicide" (138.1%), and "Kidnapping" (159.8%) compared to those committed in January 2024.



6.0 Healthcare Services

6.1 Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT)

To improve the health of incarcerated individuals with substance use disorders, an evidence-based Medication for Opioid Use Disorder (MOUD) program began at ADCRR in June 2023 at the Winslow Complex. Since then, all of the state-run complexes offer MAT services including medications, counseling, and discharge planning for those returning to the community.

Of the 6,729 MAT participants, 1.7% (n = 115) are veterans and 56.1% (n = 3,777) are receiving ongoing mental health services. The average MAT participant age is 37.7 years old.



7.0 Restrictive Housing

Restrictive Housing refers to housing for inmates as a result of current and ongoing institutional violence or conspiracy to commit violent acts (e.g., serious assaults on staff, serious inmate-on-inmate assaults with a weapon, or multiple inmates assaulting an inmate with a serious injury). Restrictive Housing gives inmates an opportunity to modify their behavior in a positive way so they can safely return to the general population.

Terms of Supervised Release from Prison includes but is not limited to: Return to Community Supervision, Earned Release, and Community Supervision Release.

Transition Program Release includes: Standard Transition Release and Drug Transition Release.


9.3 Reentry Centers

The Pima Reentry Center (PRC, formerly Southern Region Community Corrections Center) was first established in December 2012 as an alternative to a return to custody. This program offers structure, supervision, surveillance, and drug/alcohol education and treatment opportunities to offenders who are in technical violation of their conditions of supervised release and/or who are in need of additional structured support to successfully complete community supervision. The targeted population includes offenders who are considered to be a high risk to recidivate but a low risk to the community, technical violators of their conditions of supervised release and offenders who are homeless and in need of short term emergency housing.

In July 2016, the department opened its second Reentry Center in Maricopa County (MRC). Both programs have the goal to make community supervision more effective in protecting the public by responding to supervision violations swiftly and with certainty. The programs reduce the number of violators who require revocation by responding to negative behavior before it reaches a level of seriousness requiring incarceration and by making sure all appropriate intermediate community alternatives are used before return to custody.

10.0 AZ Crime Victims

The Office of Victim Services at ADCRR notifies victims of crimes any time an adult or juvenile inmate releases, escapes from, or dies in prison pursuant to ARS § 13-4413 and ARS § 13-4412. ARS § 13-603 (C) requires the courts to order convicted persons to pay restitution for victims' out-of-pocket losses that are directly related to the crime. ADCRR is bound under ARS § 31-230 to take a minimum of 20% and up to a maximum amount of 50% of an inmate's wages for court-ordered restitution. Through the Victim Compensation Program, Arizona provides financial assistance to victims of crime or those who become victims – more information can be found here.

Starting June 2024, the number of Victim Notifications of Release includes all types of notifications provided to victims of crimes, such as the earliest release date, death notification, escape and releases.



Different methods used by the public to contact Constituent Services from October 1, 2024 to December 31, 2024.





Number of Inmate on Inmate Assaults



13.3 Grievances

Inmate grievances are complaints related to any aspect of institutional life or condition of confinement that directly and personally affects the inmate grievant, including written instructions (e.g., Department Orders, Post Orders, and Technical Manuals), procedures, and the actions of staff as described in D.O. 802.

In January 2025, there were 1,396* non-medical grievances submitted.

*This number represents a snapshot in time from when the data was pulled, there are outstanding resolutions and the average time of resolution will change depending on the day and time it is pulled.

13.4 Self-Harm and Mortality Data

Because not all acts of inmate self-harm are suicide attempts, ADCRR has adopted a new method of counting acts of inmate self-harm. Based on a review by medical/mental health staff, these incidents will be categorized as one of the following:

- Self-Injurious Behavior: Any act of self-harm without the intention to end one's life.
- Suidcide Attempt: Any act of self-harm with the intention to end one's life.

Prior to February 1, 2024, Intentional Overdose (O) was captured in the category Overdose/Ingestion/Insertion. Beginning February 1, 2024, it will be captured as a separate event type, Intentional Overdose (O).



Of the 111 self-harm events this month, 108 (97.3%) were self-injurious behavior rather than a suicide attempt. Of the 111 self-harm events this month, 52.3% (58 of 111) were by cutting/burning/biting. Of the inmates who engaged in self-harm, about 10% (5 of 50) were responsible for roughly 49% (55 of 111) of all events for this month.









