During the site review, the auditor observed several locations throughout the facility where inmates lacked the proper staff and/or electronic surveillance supervision, inmates were not visible, unsecured doors, improper camera and/or mirror placements, and multiple locations where views were obstructed (blind spots), as evidenced by the site review checklist.

(b) With the Priority Posting Chart, the facility implements a staff hold over protocol to ensure that all priority posting locations are staffed, as evidenced by the PAQ, a review of the Priority Posting Chart and an interview with the warden. During the site review, as evidenced by the Site Review Checklist, the auditor observed several locations throughout the facility where inmates lacked the proper staff and/or electronic surveillance supervision, and inmates were not visible to staff.

(c) Whenever necessary, but no less frequently than once each year, the facility, in consultation with the PREA coordinator, assesses, determines, and documents whether adjustments are needed to:

(1) The staffing plan established pursuant to paragraph (a) of this section;

(2) The facility's deployment of video monitoring systems and other monitoring technologies; and

(3) The resources the facility has available to commit to ensure adherence to the staffing plan.

This was evidenced by a review of the annual reviews and a memo for annual PREA meetings, in addition to, an interview with the PREA coordinator.

(d) The facility implements a policy, DO 703, and practice of having intermediatelevel or higher-level supervisors conduct and document unannounced rounds to identify and deter staff sexual abuse and sexual harassment. Such policy and practice are implemented for night shifts as well as day shifts. The agency has a policy, DO 703, to prohibit staff from alerting other staff members that these supervisory rounds are occurring, unless such announcement is related to the legitimate operational functions of the facility, this was evidenced by a review of samples of unannounced rounds and interviews with intermediate and higher-level staff responsible for conducting unannounced rounds. During the site review, as evidenced by the Site Review Checklist, the auditor observed several locations throughout the facility where inmates lacked the proper staff and/or electronic surveillance supervision, inmates were not visible, unsecured doors, and multiple locations where views were obstructed (blind spots). These issues should have been noticed and reported during the PREA unannounced rounds but were not.

Based on the evidence presented, the facility is not in compliance with this standard, due to several locations throughout the facility where inmates lacked the proper staff and/or electronic surveillance supervision, inmates were not visible, unsecured doors, and multiple locations where views were obstructed (blind spots).

#### **Correction action required:**

Within 180 days of the date of this report, the facility will:

1. Staff conducting PREA unannounced rounds should be trained and/or provided detailed guidance on how to properly conduct unannounced rounds/what to pay attention too and document/take action upon issues found.

A. The facility will upload documentation in the OAS to include training roster and written training materials provided.

B. The facility will upload documentation in the OAS of proper unannounced rounds conducted to include findings and action taken, for the next 60 days.

2. The facility must examine all camera and mirror placements and angles for proper supervision and make adjustments as needed.

A. The facility will upload documentation in the OAS attesting that all cameras and mirrors have been adjusted for proper supervision.

3. The facility must increase the supervision of inmates by assuring that inmate bathroom doors within the facility have visibility for staff supervision while affording some type of privacy for inmates.

(a) The facility does not conduct cross-gender strip searches or cross-gender visual body cavity searches except in exigent circumstances or when performed by medical practitioners, as evidenced by policy DO 708 and the siter review checklist. The PAQ notates that there have not been any cross-gender strip searches or cross-gender visual body cavity searches conducted by non-medical staff.

(b) The facility does not permit cross-gender pat-down searches of female inmates, absent exigent circumstances. The facility does not restrict female inmates' access to regularly available programming or other out-of-cell opportunities in order to comply with this provision, as evidenced by the site review checklist and interviews with 12 random staff and the one and only female youthful inmate in custody.

(c) The facility documents all cross-gender strip searches and cross-gender visual body cavity searches and documents all cross-gender pat-down searches of female inmates, as evidenced by policy DO 708, the site review checklist, and interviews with 12 random staff and the one and only female youthful inmate in custody.

(d) The facility implements policies DO 125 and DO 704 that enables inmates to shower, perform bodily functions, and change clothing without nonmedical staff of the opposite gender viewing their breasts, buttocks, or genitalia, except in exigent circumstances or when such viewing is incidental to routine cell checks. Although the facility has a policies and procedures in place, during the site review, as evidenced by the site review checklist and viewing of the cameras, in the Rast Max Watch Pod, cross gender viewing in person and on camera was observed (cameras are located in each cell and each cell has a toilet). Policies and procedures require staff of the opposite gender to announce their presence when entering an inmate housing unit, as evidenced by interviews with random staff and six inmates who identify as transgender.

(e) The facility does not search or physically examine a transgender or intersex inmate for the sole purpose of determining the inmate's genital status. If the inmate's genital status is unknown, it is determined during conversations with the inmate, by reviewing medical records, or, if necessary, by learning that information as part of a broader medical examination conducted in private by a medical practitioner, as evidenced by policy DO 810.

(f) The agency trains security staff in how to conduct cross-gender pat-down searches, and searches of transgender and intersex inmates, in a professional and respectful manner, and in the least intrusive manner possible, consistent with security needs, as evidenced by a review of staff training curriculum, training plan and interviews with random staff.

Based on the evidence presented, the facility is not in compliance with this standard, due to the facility allowing cross-gender viewing in the Rast Max Watch Pod by direct supervision and through surveillance cameras.

#### **Correction action required:**

Within 180 days of the date of this report, the facility will:
1. Determine a system to afford inmates in the Rast Max Watch Pod with a level of privacy to use the restroom and shower without being viewed by staff of the opposite gender.

(c) The agency offers all victims of sexual abuse access to forensic medical examinations, at an outside facility, without financial cost, where evidentiarily or medically appropriate. Such examinations shall be performed by Sexual Assault Forensic Examiners (SAFEs) or Sexual Assault Nurse Examiners (SANEs). The agency has documented efforts to provide SAFEs or SANEs, as evidenced by policy DO 608 and a SAFE/SANE process memo.

(d) The agency has attempted to make available to the victim a victim advocate from a rape crisis center. As noted in the PAQ, the location of the facility makes any local rape crisis center not an option. Naphcare medical staff will assist upon request from victim. As evidenced by documentation of efforts and interviews with the PREA compliance manager and five inmates who reported sexual abuse.

(e) As noted in the PAQ, the location of the facility makes any local rape crisis center not an option. Naphcare medical staff will, upon request from victim, accompany and support the victim through the forensic medical examination process and investigatory interviews and will provide emotional support, crisis intervention, information, and referrals, as evidenced by interviews with the PREA compliance manager and five inmates who reported sexual abuse.

(f) The agency conducts all administrative and criminal investigations.

(h) As noted in the PAQ, the location of the facility makes any local rape crisis center not an option. Naphcare medical staff will, upon request from victim, accompany and support the victim through the forensic medical examination process and investigatory interviews and will provide emotional support, crisis intervention, information, and referrals. The facility's contracted Naphcare medical staff have not received education concerning sexual assault and forensic examination issues in general.

Based on the evidence presented, the facility is not in compliance with this standard, due to contracted Naphcare medical staff not receiving education concerning sexual assault and forensic examination issues in general to be able to accompany and

support the victim through the forensic medical examination process and investigatory interviews and will provide emotional support, crisis intervention, information, and referrals.

(c) All current employees who have not received such training is trained within one year of the effective date of the PREA standards, and the agency provides each employee with a full PREA training annually, exceeding this standard, as evidenced by policy DO 509 and a review of staff records.

(d) The agency documents, through employee signature, that employees understand the training they have received, as evidenced by a review of staff records.

Based on the evidence presented, the facility exceeds compliance with this standard, due to providing staff with a full PREA training annually, rather than every other year.

(e) The initial screening considers prior acts of sexual abuse, prior convictions for violent offenses, and history of prior institutional violence or sexual abuse, as known to the agency, in assessing inmates for risk of being sexually abusive, as evidenced by a review of the risk screening examples, observations made during the site review, and interviews with staff responsible for completing the risk screening.
(f) Within a set time period, not to exceed 30 days from the inmate's arrival at the facility, the facility will reassess the inmate's risk of victimization or abusiveness based upon any additional, relevant information received by the facility since the intake screening, as evidenced by policy DO 811, 30-day tracking sheet and interviews with staff responsible for completing the risk screening and random inmates.
(g) An inmate's risk level is reassessed when warranted due to a referral, request, incident of sexual abuse, or receipt of additional information that bears on the inmate's risk of sexual victimization or abusiveness, as evidenced by policy DO 811, a review of risk screening examples and interviews with staff responsible for completing the risk screening and random inmates.
(h) Inmates are not disciplined for refusing to answer, or for not disclosing complete information in response to, questions asked on the risk screening, as evidenced by policy DO 811 and interviews with staff responsible for completing the risk screening.
(i) The agency implements appropriate controls on the dissemination within the facility of responses to questions asked pursuant to this standard in order to ensure that sensitive information is not exploited to the inmate's detriment by staff or other inmates, as evidenced by observations made during the site review and interviews with the PREA coordinator, PREA compliance manager and staff responsible for completing the risk screening.
Based on the evidence presented, the facility is in compliance with this standard.

115.42	Use of screening information

(e) A transgender or intersex inmate's own view with respect to his or her own safety are given serious consideration, as evidenced by interviews with the PREA compliance manager, staff responsible for completing the risk screening and transgender inmates.
(f) Transgender and intersex inmates are given the opportunity to shower separately from other inmates, as evidenced by transgender accommodation documentation, and interviews with the PREA compliance manager, staff responsible for completing the risk screening and transgender inmates.
(g) The agency does not place lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, or intersex inmates in dedicated facilities, units, or wings solely on the basis of such identification or status, unless such placement is in a dedicated facility, unit, or wing established in connection with a consent decree, legal settlement, or legal judgment for the purpose of protecting such inmates, as evidenced by housing assignments of LGBTI inmates, and interviews with the PREA coordinator, PREA compliance manager and inmates who identify as lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender or intersex.
Based on the evidence presented, the facility is in compliance with this standard.

(c) The facility will assign such inmates to involuntary segregated housing only until an alternative means of separation from likely abusers can be arranged, and such an assignment shall not ordinarily exceed a period of 30 days, as evidenced by interviews with the warden and staff who supervise segregated housing. According to the PAQ, no inmates at high risk for sexual victimization have been placed in involuntary segregated housing in the last twelve months.
(d) If an involuntary segregated housing assignment is made, the facility will clearly document: (1) The basis for the facility's concern for the inmate's safety; and (2) The reason why no alternative means of separation can be arranged. According to the PAQ, no inmates at high risk for sexual victimization have been placed in involuntary segregated housing in the last twelve months.
(e) Every 30 days, the facility shall afford each such inmate a review to determine whether there is a continuing need for separation from the general population, as evidenced by policy DO 805 and interviews with staff who supervise segregated housing. According to the PAQ, no inmates at high risk for sexual victimization have been placed in involuntary segregated housing in the last twelve months.
Based on the evidence presented, the facility is in compliance with this standard.

(d) The agency will provide a method for staff to privately report sexual abuse and sexual harassment of inmates, as evidenced by policies DO 125 and DO 527, the employee handbook, protocol testing, and interviews with random staff. According to the PAQ, employees can privately report immediately to the Inspector General's Office / PREA Unit under the Inspector General. This can be done by email or telephone.

(3) The agency may claim an extension of time to respond, of up to 70 days, if the normal time period for response is insufficient to make an appropriate decision. (4) At any level of the administrative process, including the final level, if the inmate does not receive a response within the time allotted for reply, including any properly noticed extension, the inmate may consider the absence of a response to be a denial at that level. According to the PAQ, there have not been any instances, in the past 12 months of grievances filed that alleged sexual abuse.

(e) As evidenced by policy DO 802 and observations made during the site review, (1) Third parties, including fellow inmates, staff members, family members, attorneys, and outside advocates, will be permitted to assist inmates in filing requests for administrative remedies relating to allegations of sexual abuse, and will also be permitted to file such requests on behalf of inmates. (2) If a third party files such a request on behalf of an inmate, the facility may require as a condition of processing the request that the alleged victim agree to have the request filed on his or her behalf, and may also require the alleged victim to personally pursue any subsequent steps in the administrative remedy process. (3) If the inmate declines to have the request processed on his or her behalf, the agency shall document the inmate's decision. According to the PAQ, there have not been any grievances alleging sexual abuse filed by inmates in the past 12 months in which the inmate declined third-party assistance, containing documentation of the inmate's decision to decline.

(f) As evidenced by policy DO 802, (1) The agency will establish procedures for the filing of an emergency grievance alleging that an inmate is subject to a substantial risk of imminent sexual abuse. (2) After receiving an emergency grievance alleging an inmate is subject to a substantial risk of imminent sexual abuse, the agency will immediately forward the grievance (or any portion thereof that alleges the substantial risk of imminent sexual abuse) to a level of review at which immediate corrective action may be taken, will provide an initial response within 48 hours, and will issue a final agency decision within 5 calendar days. The initial response and final agency decision will document the agency's determination whether the inmate is in substantial risk of imminent sexual abuse and the action taken in response to the emergency grievance.
