ADC Veterans float wins 1st place

For the third year in a row, the Arizona Department of Corrections entry in the annual Phoenix Veterans Hospital Veterans Day Parade has won a top award from the Veterans Affairs Administration.

The ADC float won 1st place in the State Government float category. Interim Medical Center Director Dr. Jamie Robbins presented the trophy to ASPC-Lewis Warden Tara Diaz and Rio Salado WBE Instructor Eric Richardson during the award ceremony held at the East Valley Institute of Technology on Dec. 2.



Receiving the 1st place award for the Arizona Department of Corrections were ASPC-Lewis Warden Tara Diaz and Rio Salado WBE Instructor Eric Richardson. The trophy was presented to the ADC by Interim Medical Center Director Dr. Jamie Robbins.



This year's Phoenix VA Veterans Day Parade was on 11/11/11 and the Arizona Department of Corrections entry was a huge hit with the 200,000 plus spectators in attendance.

The theme of the parade this year was "Veterans, Our Resilient Heroes" and the centerpiece of the ADC float was a scale model of an Apache Helicopter, complete with a pilot and gunner, flying over a war-torn building. A

Marine sniper team and a communications officer complete the battle scene. On the sides of the float, two figures representing the men and women who serve our country hold the flags of the four armed services. The back of the float held an Arizona memorial with the depictions of two former Arizona Department of Corrections officers, CO II Darrell Kasson and CO II Charles Browning, who were killed in Iraq

and Afghanistan while serving in the Arizona National Guard.

Riding on the float this year were ADC staff from around Arizona. Representing the US Army were CO II Hadar Espinoza and CO II Jesus L. Romero. Representing the US Navy were CO II Rodolfo Morales, CO III William Eastwood and CO II Saul Miller. Representing the USMC were CO II Jose







Ronald R. Credio, who was promoted on Dec. 3, 2011 to take on the role as Warden at ASPC-Eyman, has been employed with the Arizona Department of Corrections for over 17 years. He began his career August 1994 as a Correctional Officer at ASPC-Eyman/Rynning Unit and later continued his managerial advancements to the positions of Sergeant at ASPC-Florence/Central Unit and to Lieutenant at ASPC-Eyman/Meadows Unit & ASPC-Florence/Florence West.

Mr. Credio then rose to the rank of Captain at ASPC-Florence/Picacho & North Unit before being promoted to Associate Deputy Warden at ASPC-Florence/South Unit. He served as Deputy Warden at ASPC-Phoenix/Globe

& Alhambra, ASPC-Florence/South Unit and ASPC-Eyman/Rynning Unit before taking over as Deputy Warden of Operations at ASPC-Florence.

Mr. Credio has a strong educational background with a Bachelor of Science in Public Safety Administration, AAS in Corrections, AAS in Management and Certificates in Management and Business.

Warden Credio is highly motivated and embraces challenges while working under pressure. That is when she obtained her Bachelor of Science degree in Criminal Justice from the Northern Arizona University in Flagstaff, Arizona.

Warden Escapule joined the Department in 1996 as a Correctional Officer I at the ASPC-Douglas. In her fifteen years with the agency, she has increasingly sought challenging assignments and educational opportunities that would prove beneficial in promotional opportunities.

In 1998, Mrs. Escapule promoted to CO III at ASPC-Yuma, followed by a promotion to Correctional Officer IV. In 2005, she was promoted to Deputy Warden at ASPC-Tucson, followed by her promotion to Deputy

Warden of Operations in 2007 at ASPC-Yuma.

On November 12, 2011, she promoted to Correctional Administrator IV, or Warden, at ASPC-Winslow, providing supervision and management to a prison complex that employs approximately 590 Administrative, Security and Support Staff. ASPC-Winslow includes two minimum custody and one medium/close custody correctional units that house approximately 2000 inmates.

Warden Escapule's goal is "succession planning" to create a team concept for all ADC employees. She plans to accomplish this through demonstrating effective management and operation of the facility, along with implementation of systems related to core security practices and staff and inmate management within the correctional environment.

CO responds to Joplin Tornado

Following the tornado that hit Joplin Missouri last May, CO II Terry Stringer, ASPC-Eyman/Cook Unit, and his wife set out to help the people that were devastated by the massive tornados. On June 5, they headed out to Joplin. Along the way they stopped in Columbus, Kansas, where they were offered lodging from very generous and wonderful woman who did not even know them, but opened up her home and made them feel welcomed. They saw a lot of this type of generosity

over the three days they were assisting. Generosity just filled the air and hope was in sight for these families in need.

CO II Stringer says unless you see it for yourself, you just cannot get the full scope of the tornado's destruction. The Stringer's spent the three days cleaning up debris all over the town and out of people's yards, stacking wood in one pile, stacking metal in another. Very little personal belongings could be found and returned to the homeowner due to the extensive

damage.

Both Officer Stringer and his wife say that they did not hear one complaint from the homeowners regarding anything. The volunteers and everyone involved in the clean up efforts kept an upbeat attitude despite such devastation. Officer Stringer says the people of Joplin and all the volunteers treated them very well. When they found out how far they had traveled, they could not thank them enough. CO II Stringer says, "My wife and I

had the conversation between ourselves that we should thank them. They completely renewed our faith in Americans and the American dream that when disaster strikes Americans will pull together and be there to help a neighbor they don't even know." They made several new friends and heard the stories of survival, loss and the heroics of many, many individuals. They hope to make some more trips in the future to Joplin as the cleanup process is expected to take many years.

Article reprinted from a Columbus, Kansas newspaper about CO II Stringer's time assisting the victims of the Joplin Tornado.

"I was sitting watching television news about the tornado in Joplin, Missouri," said Terry Stringer. "I said to my wife, you know, we need to go help those people, I've got some vacation time, let's go."

The Florence, Arizona couple got on line to find a motel room. None were available in Joplin. Terry is a guard in a state prison near Florence, his wife Danette had also been a guard but no longer works.

He had a week's vacation, and they talked about which would be better, going to a resort or helping folks in need.

Helping was the answer.

"We didn't know what towns were near Joplin, so we just put a note on-line said, coming to Joplin to help does anybody know where we can stay," said Stringer. "A few minutes later, bam, we get this note back from 'Angel House' Columbus, Kansas saying 'come on down.'"

"We drove straight through and when we arrived Shelia had dinner ready and a nice place to stay," continued Stringer.

He was referring to Sheila Mullen-Coburn, a Columbus resident transplanted from California by way of Oklahoma.

"I just had to help the people in Joplin," said Coburn. "One of the ways I could help was provide some of the workers a place to stay while they are cleaning up the disaster."

"We were so shocked about the people and how helpful they were. We went and signed up to help and they gave us the right kind of masks, drove us to a neighbor-

hood we didn't know where we were, but you know, every few minutes they brought water or soft drinks and at meal time all week they were coming with hot meals. Somebody was always cooking something," said Stringer. "Coming here was a good decision."

"The first day we were over there, we were just overwhelmed by the destruction, it was ten times worse than what we saw on television," said Stringer. "The first day an old man was out there, climbing up a ladder to a second story which was gone, it was so sad. It was heartbreaking."

"The vacation paid off in spades," said Stringer. "It's been wonderful, we had never done anything like this before, but we will again. We met a guy who came from Michigan and worked a day then went back home."

The Stringers left the next morning to go home; they were a little worried about the forest fires just a couple hours from their home in Arizona.

"We have fallen in love with the area, we are even talking about retiring here, the people are great, the evenings sitting on the deck with the cool breezes, even if we don't move here we are definitely coming back," said Stringer.

"You're welcome to stay here," said Sheila.

The Stringers and Sheila have become friends, because they both wanted to help folks they didn't know before the tornado hit Joplin.



The Arizona Department of Corrections congratulates the recent graduates of the Correctional Officer Training Academy. COTA is located on 40 acres in the foothills west of Tucson, with additional classes held at other locations at prisons around the state as necessary and twice a year COTA also hosts a K-9 Academy. COTA provides training for ADC cadets and tenured staff and for county jails and other detention centers around the state. The curriculum encompasses 360 contact hours and the graduating cadets receive 21 Community College credits, which they can then use towards higher-level education degrees. Cadets are trained and assessed in six different areas including academics, physical fitness, firearm qualification, self defense, professional behavior and ethical standards. Following nine weeks of training, graduates are sworn in as Correctional Officers.

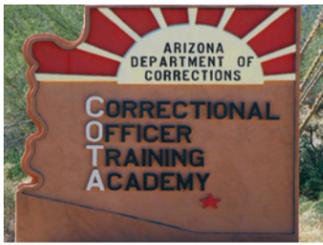

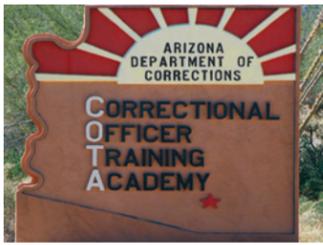

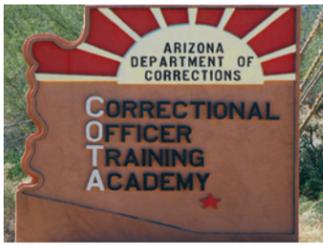
